Subject: Prioritising Sustainability Commission and Team work on

Local Development Framework documents

Ward(s) affected: All

#### 1. Purpose of the report

1.1 To seek the views of the Commission about a proposal to prioritise its scrutiny of Sustainability Appraisals and their scoping reports within the Local Development Framework (LDF).

#### 2. Recommendations

That the Sustainability Commission:

2.1 Agrees to prioritise its input on Sustainability Appraisals and their scoping reports as set out in Appendix 1.

#### 3. Background

- 3.1 The new planning system emphasises the need for sustainability to be at the centre of the plan preparation process. Each of the local development documents requires a sustainability appraisal (SA and in some cases a strategic environmental assessment SEA) with the exception of the Statement of Community Involvement. A scoping report is developed first for each SA.
- 3.2 On 19<sup>th</sup> January 2005 the Commission agreed that it should have a key consultative and advisory role at the main stages of document preparation on SA matters:
  - early scoping/stakeholder and community involvement stage, to discuss issues and options for the sustainability appraisal
  - the preferred options stage when the consultation draft of the sustainability appraisal will be considered.



- 3.3 This consultative and advisory role applies to all local development documents requiring a sustainability appraisal.
  - 3.4 Further refinement of this was felt by the Commission to be necessary and on 24 May 2006 the Commission agreed that it would help if City Planning provided a short summary of the documents being considered; and the Sustainability Team made recommendations to the Commission about any changes that should be made to the SA or Scoping report.

#### 4. Further refinements to the Commission approach

- 4.1 The Sustainability Commission and Team have grappled with a number of formats and suggestions about how to deal with often long and complex LDF documents.
- 4.2 It has become apparent to officers that with the very large number of Supplementary and Development Planning Documents being produced, further prioritisation is necessary.
- 4.3 This is because the Sustainability Team does not have sufficient resources to take on the full workload that the existing approach would require, due to increasing demands and workload in other areas (e.g. major projects, Carbon Management Programme, Water Action Plan, Sustainable Building Design SPD); and because Commission meetings might otherwise be heavily dominated by these reports.
- 4.4 It is also considered that a disproportionate amount of time would otherwise be spent reviewing some documents (e.g. writing a report about the scoping report of the sustainability appraisal of the Advertisement Control SPD) when it would be better spent on others.
- 4.5 It is therefore proposed that the Commission takes a view on the priority of having an input into forthcoming documents, based on their strategic significance, likely impact on sustainability, and whether or not it will have further opportunities to comment.
- 4.6 So it is proposed that while the Sustainability Team will always bring comments on Sustainability Appraisals of Development Plan documents to the Commission, scoping reports and SA's of SPD's will just be emailed to Commission members for comments.
- 4.7 The exception proposed is the Sustainable Building Design SPD, as this is regarded as one central to the future of sustainability in the city.

5.1 The Sustainability Team and Planning Policy have been consulted on the report.

#### SPD Sustainable Building Design - Scoping & Sustainability Appraisal Report

A key objective of the SPD is to raise the level of sustainability in development across the city. The SPD will contain targets and thresholds for minimum standards for environmental performance in developments for (e.g.) renewable energy production and CO2 emission reduction targets. Given the Commission's remit and previous recommendation on a renewables target, this Sustainability Appraisal Report will be brought to members for comment.
