#### This council notes:

- 1) Our highly constrained council budget, described as one of the most challenging this council has seen, with in-year and multi-year pressures impacting on services.
- 2) Resident frustration about council finances in areas of particular concern to them, including about the basis for decision-making on significant items of spend, and service cuts desire to have a well-run council, with good financial management, and services protected and improved.
- 3) The commitment by the council Administration to ensuring open and transparent local government under the Cabinet system.
- 4) The value that Participatory Budgeting (PB) and Participatory Advocacy (PA) can add, that Brighton & Hove City Council already uses participatory approaches, including for the recently launched Better Brighton & Hove Fund, and the availability of the new Your Voice channel on the council website to facilitate participatory approaches.

# Therefore, Council resolves to:

- 1) Proactively shift from a culture of 'need to know' to one of trust, openness and transparency in budget decision-making.
- 2) Acknowledge that a draft budget has been published in December this year, welcome this as good practice, and agree that publication of draft budget proposals in December should remain the aim in future years. Request of the Finance Lead in future years to publish a draft-budget in December, prior to Budget Council in February; to allow the public, businesses and the VCS time to provide constructive comment and input on draft proposals.
- 3) Request of the Finance Lead to raise the profile of budget communication material, aiming to increasing public knowledge and awareness of budget

challenges. Request that all councillors seek to understand the budget-setting process and play their part in promoting public understanding of budget challenges.

4) Propose to our Scrutiny Committee chairs that they jointly commission a Task and Finish Group to review potential for PB approaches in council-budget development and to suggest that this review may consider (a) earmarking a small proportion of a Directorate budget to PB approaches (b) piloting PA approaches to help inform Administration messaging to HMG on Council finances. Ask Cabinet to continue and, where appropriate, expand targeted and proportionate participatory approaches to budget-setting, including building on the Better Brighton & Hove Fund and use of the Your Voice platform, and invite Scrutiny Committee chairs to consider whether any refinements are needed within existing arrangements to strengthen budget scrutiny and engagement, while avoiding the creation of new resource-intensive structures during the current financial challenges.

# **Supporting information:**

- 1) Early budget publication and participatory approaches have previously been used by this Council.
- 2) According to the LGA, participatory budgeting can be most useful after a devolution deal has been agreed and decisions need to be made about budget allocations. Budgets can be spent in a way which better reflects the strengths, needs and aspirations of the local community and can improve self-confidence, increase volunteering and faith in local service providers, helping to establish positive relationships with citizens and organisation within devolution areas. - 1) The heartbreaking story of toddler Awaab Ishak's death as a result of damp and mould in his home, which shone a spotlight into poor living conditions across households in Britain.
- 2) **The Government's** Awaab's Law which took effect on 27th October 2025 to prevent similar deaths - places strict timelines on some landlords to address emergency and significant hazards in their properties.
- 3) The Government's historic Renters Right Act 2025 which includes welcome proposals to extend Awaab's Law to privately rented homes. While Awaab's Law applies to all social landlords, it does not apply to long leasehold, owner-occupied, low-cost home ownership, temporary or occupied under a license, supported accommodation, or shared ownership properties.
- 4) That all tenants across Brighton & Hove struggling with damp and mouldinfested properties, including those currently excluded from Awaab's law, deserve to live in healthy and well-maintained homes, free from conditions that could impact health and wellbeing.
- 5) The Administration has taken bold action on housing quality including introducing a landlord licensing scheme, radically reducing the council repair backlog, restoring HMO licensing, and directly purchasing council and temporary accommodation.

## Therefore, Council resolves to:

1) Request that the next update to Cabinet about the Administration's Housing Strategy includes a review of what we have done so far in relation to Awaab's Law for our council tenants and what more we can do in relation a report comes to a future Cabinet meeting, exploring how we as a council can expand the intention of Awaab's Law to cover as many

## tenants as possible, including but not limited to:

- a. reviewing future external accommodation contracts, setting out clear targets and inspection schedules for external accommodation contracts, and robust management of, and taking more proactive action on current contracts.
- b. working in close partnership with council tenants on how to improve and prioritise housing maintenance of council-owned properties.
- c. addressing poor property conditions in the private rented sector through implementing the next phase of the Administration's investigating how elements of Awaab's Law could improve the landlord licensing scheme., and whether the wider roll-out of the scheme could be sped up.
