<b>Adult Social Care</b>	
Area Based Grants Carers Grant	£ What it Provides 1,231,790 Adult Social Care receives 80% of the Carers Grant, with 20% going to CYPT.Support to carers contributes to the council's corporate objectives in many ways including the following:  (1) Identifying carers' needs in relation to education and employment, facilitating access to these and supporting carers to remain in work by ensuring that services to the cared for person meet the needs of the carer as well; (2) Ensuring value for money and good contract management when commissioning services from the community and voluntary sector; (3) Locality based development and casework service for older carers and carers of older people as part of the LAA 50+ neighbourhood work which targeted especially those carers not previously known by/in touch with services or receiving support in their caring role (4) Commissioning of an assessment service in the voluntary sector specifically for young carers aged 8-17 and a service for young carers whose parents misuse substances (5) Monitoring of take up of carers' assessments and services by age, gender, ethnicity
Preserved Rights	(6) Specific support to carers of substance misusers (7) Funding of the Carers Forums held quarterly and open to all carers and attended by managers from key statutory service 1,595,840 This grant has been paid to local authorities since April 2002 to reflect the cost of Preserved Rights clients either transferred to the local authority from the DSS or already being "topped-up" by the local authority. This funding is primarily used to support the Community Care budget which is used to fund care packages for some of the most vulnerable people within the city. It also supports the administration for these
Learning Disability Development Fund	The Learning Disability Development Fund is used to develop opportunities in line with the principles of the government's Valuing People and Valuing People Now papers.  This is a development fund used to give citizens with learning disabilities opportunities they would not otherwise have. This fund is allocated by the Learning Disability Partnership Board, which is a local community partnership.
Independent Mental Capacity Advocate	144,640 The Mental Capacity Act (as implemented) and the related Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards (DOLS) - also funded via this grant, place a statutory duty on the Council in relation to those people who may lack capacity to make decisions and also those people whose care may constitute a deprivation of liberty in contravention of recent
Mental Health Grant	818,577 This grant currently supports revenue expenditure in carrying out mental health services in the city and links to the council's corporate objective of working together to protect the most vulnerable people. The majority of the grant is used to fund staff posts and various contracts with independent providers.
