### **Notice of Motion**

#### **Conservative Group**

This Council:

- 1. Notes that the Administration has chosen to close schools and reduce admission numbers at others due to the falling numbers of children and families in Brighton and Hove.
- 2. Notes that there has been a 22% drop in children aged 0-4 living in the city between the 2011 and 2021 censuses.
- 3. Further notes that Brighton & Hove's population profile had fewer children & young people aged 0 to 19 (20.5%) compared to the South East (23.1%) and England (23.1%).
- 4. Believes that there are many ways to attract families to Brighton and Hove including, but not limited to:
  - Development of affordable family sized houses rather than flats
  - Improving infrastructure, including NHS services and GPs, that is needed alongside new developments for both new and existing residents
  - Improving leisure facilities and parks

This council therefore resolves to:

- 1. Request officers to bring a report to the next Childrens, Families & Schools Committee (or the relevant Overview and Scrutiny Committee should the new governance system be approved) outlining options for:-
  - (a) a holistic approach to city wide policies to make Brighton and Hove an attractive place for families and young people to live in;
  - (b) adding families with children under the age of 18 as a separate and specific category to the list of different population groups in Equality Impact Assessments to ensure that the impact of future policies on families are given serious consideration
